YEAR IN REVIEW





The four Joint Collaborative Committees (JCCs) represent a partnership of Doctors of BC and the BC Government with funds allocated to the Committees from the Physician Master Agreement (PMA).

Through 2022/23 the four JCCs including Family Practice Services Committee (FPSC), Specialist Services Committee (SSC), Shared Care Committee (SCC) and the Joint Standing Committee on Rural Issues (JSC), continued to bring together doctors, government, health authorities, patients and families, and other stakeholders.

Activities focused on improving BC's health care system for patients and families and caregivers, building physician capacity, and coordinating system services.



Family Practice Services Committee (FPSC)

FPSC supports family doctors to lead and influence the delivery of primary care in BC.



Specialist Services Committee (SSC)

SSC supports a collaborative approach to deliver specialist services and improve the specialist care system.



Shared Care Committee (SCC)

SCC improves the coordination of patient care between family and specialist physicians.



Joint Standing Committee on **Rural Issues (JSC)**

JSC focuses primarily on programs and incentives to support rural medicine.

In partnership with Health Quality BC (formerly BC Patient Safety Quality Council), physicians and health care providers demonstrated the value of collaboration through showcasing quality improvement (QI) projects, and provided an opportunity for physicians to reunite with colleagues and partners post-pandemic.




HEALTH SYSTEM REDESIGN (HSR)

Facilitates physician engagement and collaboration in planning, decision making, and implementation of new or redesigned health services and/or quality improvement provided by the health authorities. Aligns across the health system and reflects the Triple Aim.

2022/23 Highlight:

A new three-year funding agreement was approved for 2022-2025, with funding from the JCCs: Specialist Services, Shared Care, and Family Practice Services Committees.

PHYSICIAN PEER SUPPORT INITIATIVE

A partnership of the JCCs and the BC Physician Health Program (PHP) that aims to:

- Build capacity among local physician organizations to implement peer support programs
- Train physicians to provide emotional non-clinical support to their colleagues who are experiencing work and life-related stressors.

2022/23 Highlights:

PHP JCC Physician Peer Support Initiative launched in five sites with training provided by Dr Jo Shapiro and Dr Maureen Mayhew. All five sites launched between November 2022 and April 2023 with 16 peer support interactions during Q1 2023.

2022/23 Highlights:

Doctors of BC and the JCCs hosted a Truth and Reconciliation ceremony in September 2022 to honour our commitment to walking with First Nations, Métis, and Inuit peoples on our collective journey to ensure Indigenous patients have access to culturally safe health care.

FIRST NATION COMMUNITY BASED **EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING SESSIONS**

(formally known as Longhouse sessions)

The JCCs partnered with Len Pierre Consulting and First Nation communities across BC to host cultural experiential learning sessions for physicians, to encourage on-going learning and relationship building between participants and First Nations communities.

Physicians were welcomed into the Snuneymuxw (Nanaimo), Kwantlen (Langley), and Sts'Ailes (Agassiz) communities to:

- Learn about cultural safety education within the First Nation community
- Gain a deeper understanding about residential school trauma
- Experience traditional food, dwelling, songs, protocols, language, history, and stories
- Connect with local health staff and providers that work in the First Nation community

More locations will be shared in the upcoming months.

JCC WEBINAR SERIES: ELEMENTS OF INDIGENOUS HEALTH AND HEALING
